

NEW PASTOR WELCOMED

On Saturday, November 8th, Most Rev. Donald W. Trautman, Auxiliary Bishop of the Buffalo Diocese, will install Rev. Robert J. Biesinger as the fourth pastor of St. Aloysius Parish. The installation at the 7:00 p.m. Mass will be followed by a reception in the school hall.

A native of Buffalo, Fr. Biesinger attended St. Vincent de Paul grammar school, Canisius High School, and Canisius College. He studied for the priesthood at Our Lady of the Angels Seminary, Niagara University, and was ordained to the priesthood on May 26, 1956,

Fr. Biesinger has served on the Faculty of Baker Victory High School where he taught Latin and Religion; served as Treasurer and Athletic Moderator, coached the Debate and Tennis teams, and directed the school's Drill Team and Color Guard.

His priestly assignments include assistant pastorships at SS. Peter and Paul Parish, Williamsville; Immaculate Conception Parish, East Bethany; and St. Pary Parish, Lockport. For the past eleven years he has served as Pastor of Holy Family Parish, Machias, and Blessed Sacrament Parish, Delevan.

He is the son of the late Edward and Estelle Biesinger and has two sisters, Dorothy M. Biesinger of Chicago and Mary Agnes Biesinger of Buffalo.

A former recipient of the Man of the Year Award at Baker Victory, Fr. Biesinger is a member of the Diocesan Youth Advisory Board, Chaplain of the NY-Penn. Parade and Judging Association; and serves as vice-president of the Bi-State Color Guard Circuit.

Citing the parish school as the "building block of the Parish Family," Fr. Biesinger notes that "we must all use our talents to serve each other. All segments of the parish, from the elderly to the very young, must work together to be where we should be for the Church of the 20th Century."
