Letters of Recommendation: Those chosen to be Godparents at Baptism or Sponsors at Confirmation are to be role models in the practice of the Catholic Faith. Therefore, those seeking a Letter of Recommendation are expected to attend Mass regularly, live according to Gospel Values, be at least 16 years of age, have received the Sacrament of Confirmation, and be generous in their service of others.

Parish Registration: New parishioners are always welcome within the Community of St. Aloysius Gonzaga. Members of the Evangelization Committee meet with new parishioners, sharing with them information on our parish and inviting the new parishioners to become actively involved in the faith life and ministerial opportunities of our parish.

REFLECTING ON THE WORD OF GOD: The question posed in today's Gospel requires Jesus to interpret the Law of Moses. The Mosaic Law consists of the Ten Commandments and many additional commandments, numbering into the hundreds. For a devout Jew, adherence to the Mosaic Law is an expression of faithfulness to God's covenant with Israel. The ranking of these commandments was regularly debated among the teachers of the Law. Jesus was not the only Jewish religious teacher to connect these two commandments, love of God and love of neighbor. Both of these commandments were central elements of the religious tradition that Jesus learned from his Jewish community. Indeed, these commandments continue to be central aspects of contemporary Jewish religious understanding. Jesus' response to his questioners proposed an integral connection between these two aspects of the Jewish Law. Love of God finds its expression in our love for our neighbor. Many believe, however, that this connection was heard in a new and fresh way when spoken by Jesus.

IN THE WORDS OF POPE FRANCIS: Being a neighbor means bringing the newness of God into the lives of our brothers and sisters. It serves as an antidote to the temptation of easy answers and fast fixes. Let us ask ourselves whether, as Christians, we are capable of becoming neighbors, stepping out of our circles and embracing those who are not "one of us", those whom God ardently seeks. A temptation so often found in the Scriptures will always be there: the temptation to wash our hands. It is what Cain did with Abel, and Pilate with Jesus: they washed their hands. But we want to imitate Jesus and, like him, to dirty our hands. He stopped on the road for Bartimaeus. He is the light of the world, who bent down to help a blind man. Let us realize that the Lord has dirtied his hands for each one of us. Let us look at the cross, start from there and remember that God became my neighbor in sin and death. He became my neighbor: it all starts from there. And when, out of love of him, we too become neighbors, we become bringers of new life. Not teachers of everyone, not specialists in the sacred, but witnesses of the love that saves.

It is our belief that our personal prayer and the offering of the Eucharist for those who have been touched by the mystery of death assist our beloved deceased into the Presence of God. Our beloved deceased, freed from the remnants of sin, go no further than God...and God is ever near!

May our deceased parishioners and friends, and all the souls of the Faithful Departed, through the mercy of God rest in Peace. Amen!

HOLY NAME SOCIETY: Our Holy Name Society will present its 9th annual "Day of Thanksgiving" on Friday, November 9th, in our Eucharistic Adoration Chapel, from 1:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. Holy Name members are invited to devote one hour during those hours to spend time reflecting on the many times God has blessed our lives. The **Day of Thanksgiving** is open to everyone. If you are unable to spend a full hour in the Adoration Chapel, please join us, if even for only a few minutes, to give thanks for the number of times God has responded to your prayers and blessed your life.

WHEN WAS THE LAST TIME YOU... you encouraged one of your children or grandchildren to think about becoming a Priest or Sister?

ALL SOULS DAY MASS INTENTIONS: As has been our custom here at St. Aloysius Gonzaga, during November, the month of All Souls, our All Souls envelopes are given a place of honor in our sanctuary and those whose names are listed on the envelopes are remembered in a special way during our celebrations of Holy Mass. Any donations received are divided into \$15.00 Mass offerings. Many of the Masses are regularly celebrated here at St. Aloysius Gonzaga. Some of the Mass stipends are shared with our retired, senior priests and with priests who do not have sufficient stipends for daily Masses. Parish Leadership hopes that this disbursement of Mass stipends continues to meet with the approval of parishioners and donors.

Our Catholic practice of offering Holy Mass for the deceased has its biblical roots in the Old Testament, the Second Book of Maccabees where we read: "Therefore Judas Maccabeus made atonement for the dead, that they might be delivered from their sin." The *Catechism of the Catholic Church* puts it this way: "From the beginning the Church has honored the memory of the dead and offered prayers in suffrage for them, above all the Eucharistic sacrifice, so that, thus purified, they may attain the beatific vision of God." Special All Souls Day envelopes can be found in your envelope packet and also can be found at the main entrance to our Church. So we pray... "eternal rest grant unto them, O Lord, and let perpetual light shine upon them. May their souls and the souls of all the faithful departed, through the mercy of God, rest in peace. Amen!"

CATHOLIC BOOK DISCUSSION GROUP: Because of a conflict in Father Peter's Schedule, the November meeting of our Catholic Book Discussion Group has been changed to **MONDAY, NOVEMBER 26**, at the Rectory at 7PM. And because the discussions that are taking place are so wonderful – everyone has something to say – the focus of that meeting will be completing our reflection on Chapter Two of Pope Francis' Apostolic Exhortation, *Rejoice and Be Glad*. Participants may wish to read again Chapter Two, "Two Subtle Enemies of Holiness", paragraphs 35 thru 62. They may also wish to reflect a little more on the questions in the Discussion Outline that is available in the rectory and in the Trautenberg Library.

In calling all Catholics to a deeper holiness of life, in Chapter Two, our Holy Father writes: "Not infrequently, contrary to the promptings of the Spirit, the life of the Church can become a museum piece or the possession of a select few (#58)...Here I would note that in the Church there legitimately coexist different ways of interpreting many aspects of doctrine and Christian life (#43). These are remarkable insights that come from the pen of the Pope. What exactly is Pope Francis saying and what kind of holiness is he challenging us to embrace?"

If time and interest allow, join us on **MONDAY, NOVEMBER 26**. All are welcome. There are still a few copies of the Apostolic Exhortation available free in the rectory.

SHARE OUR HARVEST APPEAL: Our annual Share Our Harvest Appeal is coming to an end. As of Wednesday, October 31st, 91 donations have been received, totaling \$4155.00. Parish Leadership and Father Peter wish to thank all who have contributed to this Fall Appeal financially and through prayer. As has been mentioned, the funds generated by this Appeal are used to meet very basic expenses like Snow Plowing and removal (this year - \$19,880.00), the higher utility bills, vendor bills, and, most importantly of all, to enhance our efforts to spread the Gospel of Jesus Christ and to meet the needs of the poor whom we are called to serve as we would serve Jesus. Last year \$9583.00 was contributed to the Fall Appeal by 156 donors.
