Therefore, those seeking a Letter of Recommendation are expected to attend Mass regularly, live according to Gospel Values, be at least 16 years of age, have received the Sacrament of Confirmation, and be generous in their service of others.

Parish Registration: New parishioners are always welcome within the Community of St. Aloysius Gonzaga. Members of the Evangelization Committee meet with new parishioners, sharing with them information on our parish and inviting the new parishioners to become actively involved in the faith life and ministerial opportunities of our parish.

REFLECTING ON THE WORD OF GOD: In the today's Gospel, Jesus observes how Jewish pilgrims are making their contributions to the temple treasury. The Temple in Jerusalem was the center of Jewish worship in the time of Jesus. It was expected that observant Jews would make pilgrimages to the Temple to offer prayer and sacrifices. Pilgrims were also expected to make a financial contribution to the temple treasury. As we would expect to be the case, Jesus observes that those who were rich contributed large sums to the treasury. Those with less means made smaller contributions. A similar situation exists in most of our parishes as well. Jesus calls attention, however, to a poor widow who makes the smallest of contributions—two coins of little value. Jesus upholds the poor widow's offering for his disciples' consideration, commending her because her small offering was an act of profound generosity, giving from her livelihood rather than her surplus. To give from our livelihood is not only an act of generosity; it is also an act of trust in God. We can only give from our need if we trust that God will provide for us. Jesus himself demonstrates the ultimate act of generosity and trust in God as he gives his life for us on the cross.

IN THE WORDS OF POPE FRANCIS: The scene is set in the temple of Jerusalem, precisely in the place where people are tossing coins as offerings. There are many rich people putting in large sums, and there is a poor woman, a widow, who contributes only two bits, two small coins. Jesus observes the woman carefully and calls the disciples' attention to the sharp contrast of the scene. The wealthy contributed with great ostentation what for them was superfluous, while the widow, Jesus says, "put in everything she had, her whole living". For this reason, Jesus says, she gave the most of all. Because of her extreme poverty, she could have offered a single coin to the temple and kept the other for herself. But she did not want to give just half to God; she divested herself of everything. In her poverty she understood that in having God, she had everything; she felt completely loved by him and in turn loved him completely. What a beautiful example this little old woman offers us! Let us ask the Lord to admit us to the school of this poor widow, whom Jesus presents as a teacher of the living Gospel even to the astonishment of the disciples. Through the intercession of Mary, the poor woman who gave her entire life to God for us, let us ask for a heart that is poor, but rich in glad and freely given generosity.

The bagging of groceries for the Thanksgiving dinners will take place this Friday, November 16th, immediately after the 8:30AM Mass. ALL SOULS DAY MASS INTENTIONS: As has been our custom here at St. Aloysius Gonzaga, during November, the month of All Souls, our All Souls envelopes are given a place of honor in our sanctuary and those whose names are listed on the envelopes are remembered in a special way during our celebrations of Holy Mass. Any donations received are divided into \$15.00 Mass offerings. Many of the Masses are regularly celebrated here at St. Aloysius Gonzaga. Some of the Mass stipends are shared with our retired, senior priests and with priests who do not have sufficient stipends for daily Masses. Parish Leadership hopes that this disbursement of Mass stipends continues to meet with the approval of parishioners and donors.

Our Catholic practice of offering Holy Mass for the deceased has its biblical roots in the Old Testament, the Second Book of Maccabees where we read: "Therefore Judas Maccabeus made atonement for the dead, that they might be delivered from their sin." The *Catechism of the Catholic Church* puts it this way: "From the beginning the Church has honored the memory of the dead and offered prayers in suffrage for them, above all the Eucharistic sacrifice, so that, thus purified, they may attain the beatific vision of God." Special All Souls Day envelopes can be found in your envelope packet and also can be found at the main entrance to our Church. So we pray... "eternal rest grant unto them, O Lord, and let perpetual light shine upon them. May their souls and the souls of all the faithful departed, through the mercy of God, rest in peace. Amen!"

CATHOLIC BOOK DISCUSSION GROUP: Just a reminder that the date of our November Meeting of the Catholic Book Discussion Group has been changed to **Monday, November 26th**, at 7PM in the rectory. Participants are encouraged to re-read Chapter Two of *Rejoice and Be Glad*, paragraphs 35 thru 62. Chapter Two, "Two Subtle Enemies of Holiness", is the most difficult part of Pope Francis' Apostolic Exhortation on the universal call to holiness. In preparation for the discussion participants are also encouraged to spend some more time reflecting upon the Discussion Outline prepared by Father Peter. Copies are available in the Trautenberg Library and the rectory. Pope Francis writes: "...we can and must try to find the Lord in every human life..." (#42) Join us for the discussion on November 26th – as we help one another grow in holiness, help each other find the Lord in every person.

RITE OF CHRISTIAN INITIATION FOR ADULTS: The Rite of Christian Initiation for Adults (RCIA) is meant for women and men, college age and over, who have never been baptized, were baptized in another Christian Faith and now wish to learn more about the Catholic Church, and for those baptized Catholic but for a variety of reasons may never have received Communion, gone to Confession or been confirmed.

Our RCIA Team wishes to invite all adults to join us on a journey of faith leading to entrance into the Catholic Church or to reception of the Sacraments. If you would like more information on the RCIA experience, just give the Rectory a call or speak with Bob Rybarczyk, parish director of Faith Formation. Ideally the RCIA experience leads to a deeper and more personal relationship with Jesus, entrance into the Catholic Community and loving service to the poor and needy, searchers and seekers.

If you know an adult who would like to enter the Catholic Community or learn more about the Church as he/she prepares for Baptism, Eucharist, Penance or Confirmation, please let them know about our RCIA experience. Invite them to become a part of our program. Statistics show that for most adults the journey into the Catholic Church begins with the invitation of the committed Catholic. Be that committed Catholic and invite someone you know to learn more about our Church and living life centered in Jesus Christ.

PREPARATION FOR THE SACRAMENT OF CONFIRMATION: Our catechists, under the leadership of Bob Rybarczyk, Parish Director of Faith Formation, are ready to begin preparing our youth to receive the Sacrament of Confirmation. Students in Catholic High Schools in the tenth grade or higher are most welcome to become part of this program. Likewise public high school students 10th Grade and higher are also most welcomed. For public school students, the Confirmation Program is in addition to our Tuesday evening Religious Formation Program.

If any of our young people are interested in being prepared for the Sacrament of Confirmation, please call Kathie or Mary at the rectory. Then our candidates can expect a phone call from Bob Rybarczyk who will explain the details of the program. The entire Parish Community of St. Aloysius Gonzaga prays for our Confirmation Candidates.
