Therefore, those seeking a Letter of Recommendation are expected to attend Mass regularly, live according to Gospel Values, be at least 16 years of age, have received the Sacrament of Confirmation, and be generous in their service of others.

Parish Registration: New parishioners are always welcome within the Community of St. Aloysius Gonzaga. Members of the Evangelization Committee meet with new parishioners, sharing with them information on our parish and inviting the new parishioners to become actively involved in the faith life and ministerial opportunities of our parish.

REFLECTING ON THE WORD OF GOD: Today is the first Sunday of Advent, which is also the first Sunday of the new liturgical year. The Advent season includes the four Sundays that precede Christmas. Advent is a time of preparation for the coming of the Lord. In this season, we recall two central elements of our faith: the final coming of the Lord in glory and the incarnation of the Lord in the birth of Jesus. The key themes of the Advent season are watchful waiting, preparation, and justice. In this new liturgical year, the Gospel of Luke will be the primary Gospel proclaimed. Today's Gospel is taken from the last chapter before the passion narrative in which Jesus is teaching in the Temple. We hear Jesus speak to his disciples about the need for vigilance and prayer as they wait for the coming of the Son of Man in glory. This passage marks the conclusion of a lengthy dialogue in which Jesus predicts the destruction of the Temple in Jerusalem, warns about the persecution and tribulations to follow, and identifies the signs that will signal the coming of the Son of Man in glory.

IN THE WORDS OF POPE FRANCIS: In the readings of this Sunday's liturgy, we can see different aspects of this salvation proclaimed by God; they appear as signposts to guide us on our mission. First of all, the happiness promised by God is presented as justice. Advent is a time when we strive to open our hearts to receive the Savior, who alone is just and the sole Judge able to give to each his or her due. Yes, God is righteousness; God is justice. This, then, is why we Christians are called in the world to work for a peace founded on justice. The salvation of God which we await is also flavored with love. In preparing for the mystery of Christmas, we relive the pilgrimage which prepared God's people to receive the Son, who came to reveal that God is not only righteousness, but also and above all love. Finally, the salvation proclaimed by God has an invincible power which will make it ultimately prevail. It is amid unprecedented devastation that Jesus wishes to show his great power, his incomparable glory and the power of that love which stops at nothing, even before the falling of the heavens, the conflagration of the world or the tumult of the seas. God is stronger, more powerful, than all else. This conviction gives to the believer serenity, courage and the strength to persevere in good amid the greatest hardships. Even when the powers of Hell are unleashed, Christians must rise to the summons, their heads held high, and be ready to brave blows in this battle over which God will have the last word. And that word will be one of love and peace!

FIRST SUNDAY OF ADVENT, 29 NOVEMBER 2015

FEAST OF THE IMMACULATE CONCEPTION: This Saturday, December 8th, is the Feast of the Immaculate Conception. It is a Holy Day of Obligation for all Catholics. The *Catechism of the Catholic Church* teaches: "The most Blessed Virgin Mary was, from the first moment of her conception, by a singular grace and privilege of almighty God and by virtue of the merits of Jesus Christ, Savior of the Human race, preserved immune from all stain of original sin." (#491)...By the grace of God Mary remained free of every personal sin her whole life long." (#493) It is our hope and prayer that in honoring Mary, through her intercession, we too may grow in holiness and be less caught up in a slavery to sin.

Please note carefully the Masses here at St. Aloysius for the Feast of the Immaculate Conception. On Friday evening the Vigil Mass will be celebrated as usual at 5PM. On Saturday morning, there will be only ONE Mass at 8:30AM. (The Vigil Mass for the First Sunday of Advent will be celebrated at 5PM Saturday afternoon.)

CATHOLIC BOOK DISCUSSION GROUP: There will be no meeting of our Catholic Book Discussion Group in December. The Group will gather together again in January to continue our discussion of Pope Francis' Apostolic Exhortation, *Rejoice and Be Glad*. Members of the Group and others interested in attending are encouraged to read Chapter 3, "In the Light of the Master", paragraphs 63 thru 109 in preparation for the January discussion.

RETIREMENT FUND FOR RELIGIOUS: As a Parish Community, we are blessed to have three Congregations of Women Religious pray and minister with us: the Sisters of St. Joseph, the Felician Sisters and the Sisters of Social Service. We are also blessed to have the Jesuit Priests assist us from time to time.

Many of us look back and remember the Sisters, Brothers and Religious Order Priests who taught us in school, who ministered in our hospitals and nursing homes, who listened to us and guided us in times of stress, who prepared us for the Sacraments. How blessed we are to have these women and men of God as part of our life journeys. As Father Peter writes this article, he remembers the Sisters of Mercy who taught him at All Saints School – and he remembers the names of each one of them. Many of you could do the same.

Next weekend (December 8-9) is the annual Collection for the Retirement Fund of Religious. Many of our Sisters, Brothers and Religious Order Priests are now elderly and infirmed, residing in health care facilities, no longer in active ministries but certainly serving the Church through lives of prayer and sacrifice. This annual Collection is one way to say to those Religious who cared for us “thank you” for their lives of service and commitment to the Gospel of Jesus Christ. *There will be a special second collection.* Please lift up in prayer our retired and infirmed Religious and make your gift to this annual Retirement Fund Collection a sign of your gratitude for their long and many years of service to God and the Church.

The theme of this year’s national collection is: “Please give to those who have given a lifetime.”

CHRISTMAS OUTREACH MINISTRY – VOLUNTEERS NEEDED:

Having just completed our Thanksgiving Outreach to our needy sisters and brothers, Sister Maryann now turns her mind and heart to the needy as we celebrate Christmas. This Christmas through our Food Pantry and our Outreach Ministry the community of St. Aloysius Gonzaga and Friends will provide the ingredients for a Christmas Dinner to about 75 families. Additionally our Christmas Ministry will provide toys and gifts to 103 children. Christmas Gift Bags will also be hand delivered to 49 parishioners who are homebound or reside in a health care facility. What an amazing record of service!

The Giving Tree is already in place in our church. If you take an ornament, please return your unwrapped gift to the Church as soon as possible. The sooner your gift arrives the easier it makes it for Sister Maryann and all her helpers.

Sister Maryann could use your help on the following dates:

- Monday, December 17, immediately after 8:30AM Mass: bagging of groceries and bagging of Christmas toys;
- Wednesday, December 19, 1:00 to 3:00PM: pick up of groceries and toys;
- Thursday, December 20, immediately after 8:30AM Mass: delivery of Christmas Gifts to homebound and parishioners residing in health care facilities.

Volunteers are needed on each of these days. If your schedule allows you to lend a helping-hand, please speak to Sister Maryann personally or call the rectory and leave your name and phone number.

Our Thanksgiving and Christmas Ministries are a wonderful testimony to our ability to see Christ in all our sisters and brothers. Sister Maryann is most grateful to all who donate and volunteer to make Christmas a time when, through our kindness and generosity, Christ is born again in the hearts of all who believe.

ADVENT CONFESSIONS: How many times have we been reminded that no Advent Journey is complete – no one is ready for the Coming of Jesus – no one is prepared for the Celebration of Christmas – unless and until you have opened your heart to the mercy of God in the Sacrament of Penance. Going to Confession is an absolutely essential component of a good and complete Advent Journey.

So that the Sacrament of Penance will be more available during this Advent Season, Father Peter will hear confessions each Wednesday evening – December 5th, 12th and 19th – from 6 to 7PM. This is in addition to the regular celebrations of the Sacrament of Reconciliation on Saturday afternoons. It is hoped that the Wednesday evening Confessions will enable families to come together to Church to experience God’s mercy, pardon and peace. An Examination of Conscience has been inserted into your Advent Journey Packet. It is a wonderful way to prepare yourself for the Sacrament.

Remember the words of Pope Francis: “God never tires of forgiving us.” and “The mercy of God is greater than any sin.” Our doors are open. Our lights are on. Make sure you go to Confession sometime during this Advent Journey.

ADVENT MATERIALS: In order to help all of us make this year’s Advent Journey a special time of grace and blessing, there is a wide variety of Advent Journey materials available for you, our friends and for other family members and visitors/guests/“total” strangers.

The Advent Packets are still at the main entrance to the Church, arranged alphabetically for our parishioners. If you notice someone’s packet has not been picked up, take it with you and hand-deliver it.

There are Advent Booklets for the younger members of our community – from Pre-school thru High School. The booklets are an excellent way for families to prepare for Christmas together. Again, take as many as you need and pass them around.

In the Trautenberg Library there can be found a large variety of Advent materials you may find helpful this Advent. All materials are free – and can just be taken.

Finally, a special word of gratitude to John McMahon, Chair, and the members of the Evangelization Committee – as well as all those who volunteered - for preparing our Advent Packets.
