Letters of Recommendation: Those chosen to be Godparents at Baptism or Sponsors at Confirmation are to be role models in the practice of the Catholic Faith. Therefore, those seeking a Letter of Recommendation are expected to attend Mass regularly, live according to Gospel Values, be at least 16 years of age, have received the Sacrament of Confirmation, and be generous in their service of others.

Parish Registration: New parishioners are always welcome within the Community of St. Aloysius Gonzaga. Members of the Evangelization Committee meet with new parishioners, sharing with them information on our parish and inviting the new parishioners to become actively involved in the faith life and ministerial opportunities of our parish.

REFLECTING ON THE WORD OF GOD: Today we celebrate the feast of the Holy Family. This feast is part of the Christmas season, and we should place today's Gospel in the context of what Luke's Gospel tells us about the birth of Jesus. Luke has been answering the question "Who is Jesus?" through his stories of the births of John the Baptist and Jesus. Today's Gospel reading continues this theme. It has no parallel in the other Gospels and is the conclusion of Luke's Infancy Narrative. Mary, Joseph, and Jesus are presented in this Gospel as a faithful Jewish family. They are participating in the annual pilgrimage to Jerusalem for the feast of Passover, an event shared each year with family and friends. When Jesus is found, Luke describes him as seated in the Temple in the midst of the Jewish teachers. Although he is young, Jesus seems not to need teaching about his Jewish tradition. In his dialogue with these learned teachers, Jesus astounds them with his insight and understanding. Jesus is a child of Israel. His Father is God. In Luke's Gospel, Mary's importance is even greater than her role as Jesus' mother. Mary is the first disciple and will be present with Jesus' disciples after his Resurrection at Pentecost.

IN THE WORDS OF POPE FRANCIS: Today's Gospel passage invites families to welcome the light of hope that comes from the home of Nazareth, in which Jesus' childhood unfolded in joy. Jesus, says St Luke, "increased in wisdom and in stature, and in favor with God and man". The nuclear family of Jesus, Mary and Joseph is for each believer and especially for families an authentic school of the Gospel. Here we admire the fulfillment of the divine plan to make of the family a special community of life and love. Here we learn that every Christian nuclear family is called to be a "domestic church", to make the Gospel virtues shine and become a leaven of good in society. The classic traits of the Holy Family are: reflection and prayer, mutual understanding and respect, and a spirit of sacrifice, work and solidarity. From the exemplary witness of the Holy Family, each family can find precious guidance for the style and choices of life, and can draw strength and wisdom for each day's journey. Our Lady and Joseph teach us to welcome children as a gift of God, to beget them and raise them, cooperating wonderfully in the work of the Creator and giving to the world, in each child, a new smile. It is in a united family that children bring their existence to maturity, living out the meaningful and effective experience of freely given love, tenderness, reciprocal respect, mutual understanding, forgiveness and joy.

ANGELUS, SAINT PETER'S SQUARE, SUNDAY, 27 DECEMBER 2015

FEAST OF MARY, MOTHER OF GOD: On January 1st the Church gathers us together to celebrate the Feast of Mary, the Holy Mother of God. It is a Holy Day of Obligation for all Catholics. But even if it was not a Holy Day, what better way is there to begin the journey of a new year than participating in Mass, feasting on the Word of God and being nourished with the Body and Blood of Christ?

In calling us to honor Mary on January 1st, the Church gives us her example because she teaches us how to follow Christ. Mary is a woman of prayer – she ponders the Message of the angel in her heart. She is a woman of service – rushing to assist her cousin, Elizabeth, in her pregnancy. Mary brings Hope to all people by giving Birth to Jesus. Mary teaches us how to pray, how to serve and how to give Birth to Jesus by the kindness of our words and the gentleness of our actions.

Note the times of Masses for January 1st. Join us in honoring Mary who teaches us how to follow Jesus each day of the new year.

REFLECTING ON THE HOLY FAMILY: Saint Mother Teresa of Calcutta wrote these powerful words about the Human Family: "Everybody today seems to be in such a terrible rush, anxious for greater development and greater riches. Children have very little time for their parents and parents have very little time for their children and each other...Bring prayer to your family, bring it to your little children. Teach them to pray. For a child that prays is a happy child. A family that prays is a united family. We hear of so many broken families. And then we examine them: Why are they broken? I think because they never pray together. They are never in prayer before the Lord...If you want a happy family, if you want a holy family, give your hearts to love."

NEW YEAR'S GREETINGS: It is a joy and privilege for our Sisters, the members of our Rectory Staff and our Priests to wish you and all you love a Holy and Blessed Journey thru the New Year of Grace 2019. It is our prayer that during the new year you experience deeply the Presence of God in your life and grow in wisdom, age and grace.
