Care of the Sick: The pastoral care of the sick and homebound is a priority of our parish ministers. Please notify the rectory immediately if someone is hospitalized, enters a health care facility or is in need of the Sacrament of the Sick or the Eucharist brought to the home.

Letters of Recommendation: Those chosen to be Godparents at Baptism or Sponsors at Confirmation are to be role models in the practice of the Catholic Faith. Therefore, those seeking a Letter of Recommendation are expected to attend Mass regularly, live according to Gospel Values, be at least 16 years of age, have received the Sacrament of Confirmation, and be generous in their service of others.

Parish Registration: New parishioners are always welcome within the Community of St. Aloysius Gonzaga. Members of the Evangelization Committee meet with new parishioners, sharing with them information on our parish and inviting the new parishioners to become actively involved in the faith life and ministerial opportunities of our parish.

No BINGO ON GOOD FRIDAY AND HOLY SATURDAY. BINGO WILL RESUME NEXT WEEK.

REFLECTING ON THE WORD OF GOD: Have you tasted and seen the goodness of the Lord? Has your Lenten journey transformed your heart and been a time of renewal? What about allowing Jesus to cleanse you of your sins thru reconciliation? Have you increased your acts of charity and mercy, and changed your habits in a positive way? If your Lenten journey hasn't gone as you desired, please don't despair. I promise you that you're in good company.

Jesus' acts from today's Gospel are well remembered, so let's take a look at how Peter responds during Jesus' last Passover, Passion and death on the cross. Remember, this is the simple fisherman that Jesus chose to be the Rock upon whom He'd build His church. This simple fisherman followed Jesus' word, and His example, and changed the world by spreading the Gospel.

Peter was present at the 1st Eucharist, but did he really understand, or to him was it just another Passover meal. After the Passover meal, Peter joined the other disciples in two successive quarrels. First, the disciples can't believe any of their number would betray Jesus and squabble amongst themselves. Second, they have a petty tiff about who is the greatest among themselves. How clear, and human, that Peter doesn't understand the coming Passion. Jesus attempts to prepare the Disciples for the coming turmoil, but Peter can't comprehend what's about to happen. You can almost hear Peter saying, "Here Jesus, there's two swords over here." You can imagine Jesus rolling His eyes, sighing, pausing and saying, "Yeah, that's enough." Finally, Peter says he's willing to die for Jesus, but instead can't even stay awake while Jesus goes off to pray. Jesus performs a miracle after someone (Peter?) cuts off the servant's ear, but no one seems to notice. Shortly after this most recent miracle, Peter still denies Jesus. After spending so much time with Jesus, seeing miracles on a regular basis, learning about the Kingdom of Heaven, Peter has reason to weep bitterly upon reflecting on his behavior.

Peter was human, just like you and I, subject to the same failings and shortcomings. However, God is greater than all our faults, and is a God of reversals. Peter changes, and his change transformed the face of the world and the trajectory of its future. It's not too late for all of us to experience our own reversal and experience our best Lent ever.

Let us bring the Word of God to prayer. Lord of life, help us to taste and see your goodness, and experience a transformational last week of Lent.

IN THE WORDS OF POPE FRANCIS: "How many times do we feel alone, that we have lost our way in life. How many times do we no longer know how to begin again, overwhelmed by the effort to accept ourselves. We need to start over, but we don't know where to begin. Christians are born from the forgiveness they receive in Baptism. They are always reborn from the same place: from the surprising forgiveness of God, from his mercy which restores us...Forgiveness gives us a new beginning, makes us new creatures, helps us take hold of a new life. God's forgiveness is a not a photocopy which is identically reproduced in every passage through the confessional. Receiving pardon for our sins through a priest is always a new, distinctive and unique experience. We pass from being alone with our miseries and accusers. To being raised up and encouraged by the Lord who grants us a new start."

RANDOM THOUGHTS ON HOLY WEEK FROM THE DIARY OF FATHER HENRI NOUWEN: During this week Judas and Peter present me with the choice between running away from Jesus in despair or returning to him in hope. Judas betrayed Jesus and hanged himself. Peter denied Jesus and returned to him in tears...But Jesus came to open my ears to another voice that says, 'I am your God...and love you...do not run away from me...come back to me- not once, not twice, but always again... I am your God – the God of mercy and compassion, the God of pardon and love, the God of tenderness and care'...Do not judge yourself. Do not condemn yourself. Do not reject yourself. Let my love touch the deepest, most hidden corners of your heart and reveal to you your own beauty... This is the voice Jesus wants us to hear. It is the voice that calls us always to return to the one who has created us in love and wants to re-create us in mercy...the voice of God's mercy does not offer us a solution, but a friendship. It does not take away our problems, but promises not to avoid them. It does not tell us where it will end, but assures us that we will never be alone. A true relationship is hard work because loving is hard work, with many tears and many smiles. But it is God's work and worth every part of it."

HOLY WEEK AT ST. ALOYSIUS GONZAGA: As we enter the most solemn week during which we celebrate the Passion, Death and Resurrection of the Lord Jesus, all of us – parishioners, friends, neighbors, total strangers – are invited to journey with us as we celebrate the final days of Jesus. Our Holy Week Liturgical Schedule is as follows:

- Palm Sunday: usual Mass schedule with blessing of palms and procession, celebrating the triumphal entrance of Jesus into the City of Jerusalem.

- Tuesday, April 16th – the Celebration of the Chrism Mass in St. Joseph Cathedral at 7PM with blessings of the Sacred Oils and consecration of the Sacred Chrism. Priests of the Diocese renew their commitment to celibate love and priestly ministry. Bishop Richard Malone is Celebrant and Homilist.

- Wednesday – Spy Wednesday – Confessions at 6PM and Lenten Mass at 7PM.

- Thursday – Holy Thursday – Morning Prayer at 9AM. Celebration of the Supper of the Lord at 7PM, with washing of the feet and procession with the Eucharist into the Adoration Chapel. It is the night on which we remember how Christ gifted the Church with the Eucharist and the Priesthood at the Last Supper and also gave us the new commandment to wash one another's feet.

- Friday – Good Friday – Morning Prayer at 9AM, Liturgy of the Lord's Passion at 3PM and Stations of the Cross at 7PM.

- Saturday – Holy Saturday – Morning Prayer at 9AM. Blessing of Easter Food Baskets at 1PM.

- Great Easter Vigil – 8PM – Lighting of Easter Fire and Candle, two Baptisms, Renewal of Baptismal Promises, Readings from Scripture, Celebration of the Eucharist.

- Easter Sunday – Alleluia! Alleluia! Alleluia! – Easter Masses at 9AM and 11AM. There is no 5PM Mass Easter Sunday afternoon.

Please make a genuine effort to participate in these beautiful, prayerful and meaningful Liturgies of Holy Week. Resolve to make this week truly "holy" - graced days when individually and as a community we "taste and see the Goodness of the Lord!"

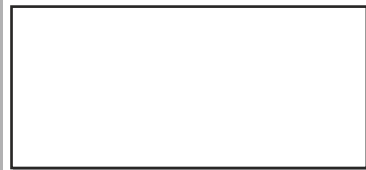
