Therefore, those seeking a Letter of Recommendation are expected to attend Mass regularly, live according to Gospel Values, be at least 16 years of age, have received the Sacrament of Confirmation, and be generous in their service of others.

Parish Registration: New parishioners are always welcome within the Community of St. Aloysius Gonzaga. Members of the Evangelization Committee meet with new parishioners, sharing with them information on our parish and inviting the new parishioners to become actively involved in the faith life and ministerial opportunities of our parish.

REFLECTING ON THE WORD OF GOD: Jesus has died and has risen. Thomas, Nathanael, John and James together with Peter go to the boat to go fishing. They go back to the life of the past as if nothing had happened. But something did happen. Something was taking place! The past did not return! "Throw the net out to the right of the boat and you will find something." They did something which perhaps they had never done in their life. Five experienced fishermen obey a carpenter who orders them to do something which is in contrast to their experience. Jesus, that unknown Person, who is on the shore, orders them to throw the net on the right side of the boat. They obey; they throw the net, and behold the unexpected result. The net was full of fish! How was this possible? How to explain this surprise so unexpected, unforeseen! Love makes one discover. The beloved disciple says, "It is the Lord". This intuition clarifies everything.

IN THE WORDS OF POPE FRANCIS: Today's Gospel recounts the third apparition of the Risen Jesus to the disciples, with the account of the miraculous catch on the shore of the lake of Galilee. John turns to Peter and says: "It is the Lord!". In that exclamation: "It is the Lord!", there is all the enthusiasm of the Paschal faith, full of joy and wonder, which sharply contrasts with the disappearance, the dejection, the sense of powerlessness that had accumulated in the disciples' hearts. The presence of the Risen Jesus transforms everything: darkness has become light, futile work has again become fruitful and promising, the sense of weariness and abandonment give way to a new impetus and to the certainty that He is with us. From that time, these same sentiments enliven the Church, the Community of the Risen One. All of us are the community of the Risen One! At first glance it might sometimes seem that the darkness of evil and the toil of daily living have got the upper hand, the Church knows with certainty that the now everlasting light of Easter shines upon those who follow the Lord Jesus. The great message of the Resurrection instills in the hearts of believers profound joy and invincible hope. Christ is truly risen! Today too, the Church continues to make this joyous message resound: joy and hope continue to flow in hearts, in faces, in gestures, in words. We Christians are all called to communicate this message of resurrection to those we meet, especially to those who suffer, to those who are alone, to those who find themselves in precarious conditions, to the sick, to refugees, to the marginalized. Let us make a ray of the light of the Risen Christ, a sign of his powerful mercy, reach everyone.

CROWNING OF THE IMAGE OF MARY: Our Religious Education Program ends this Tuesday, May 7th. Traditionally we end the year with the Crowning of the Image of Mary in our Church at 6:15PM. THREE PILLARS: Thirty gifts totaling \$868 were received from our Three Pillars practice for Lent with a check delivered to Sr. Johnice at the Response to Love Center this week. Sr. Johnice expressed her heartfelt appreciation and assurance that our gift will go far in their ministry. While a significant sum of almsgiving on its own, more importantly this result reflects a deeper Lenten experience that happened this year at St. Aloysius. Hopefully a more deliberate practice of fasting, prayer and almsgiving enabled these parishioners to move closer to Jesus throughout the 40 days and to taste and see the goodness of the Lord. As a community, may our Easter season be absolutely filled with the Holy Spirit buoyed by our prayerful Lent.

CATHOLIC BOOK DISCUSSION GROUP: As is to be expected, our Book Discussion Group did not finish discussing Chapter 4 of Pope Francis’ Apostolic Exhortation, *Rejoice and Be Glad*. Our next meeting is scheduled for Thursday, May 30, at 7PM in the rectory. Participants will continue to focus on Chapter 4 – as we find together Signs of Holiness in the world today. If you do not have a copy of the Discussion Outline, you may pick up a copy at the rectory.

In Chapter 4, Pope Francis has some great lines! For example: “Stop trying to make our Christian Life a museum of memories.”, “God is eternal newness.”, “The Church will not stand still.”, and “More than bureaucrats and functionaries, the Church needs passionate missionaries, enthusiastic about sharing true life.” Join us as we discuss what we think Pope Francis means by such statements. It is always a wonderful, life-giving discussion. Why not join us? Copies of the book are still available at the rectory. All are invited. Come as an active speaker or as an active listener. Either way you will leave changed in some way!

PROJECTS FUNDED BY UPON THIS ROCK: Because of the wonderful way in which we as a parish participated in the Upon This Rock Campaign three years ago and the faithfulness of our parishioners in fulfilling their pledges, several projects have been embraced that are only possible because of the funds returned to our parish from this Campaign.

The largest project, of course, is the painting of the interior of the Church building. This project alone costs \$30,000. There are several other items under consideration like the refinishing of the external wooden doors. Hopefully funds will still be available to finance this project.

Other projects recently completed with funding from Upon This Rock include:

- The materials in our Lenten Packets and the mailing of the packets to all parishioners cost \$1031.44.

- Four large trees behind the Convent were disease infected and were in danger of being blown over in our severe winter winds. Before causing additional damage to our Convent or our neighbors’ properties, they were taken down at a cost of \$2490.00.

- Two simple chairs were purchased for \$420.00 for our sacristy. Ministers will now be able to sit comfortably as they prepare for Mass.

- An ice machine had to be purchased for our school building. The old one was no longer able to be repaired. A used ice-machine, in very good condition, was purchased for \$1650.00.

Again, all of these projects would have had to be placed “on hold” if the projects were not funded through Upon This Rock. We simply do not have discretionary funds available at this time for such needed projects. Also, be aware that these projects were discussed with and approved by the Members of our Parish Finance Committee.

Thank you to all who participated in the Upon This Rock Campaign and those who are faithfully fulfilling their pledges. It is very obvious that this Campaign not only assisted the Diocese in a wide variety of ministries and services but also is assisting parishes like St. Aloysius Gonzaga fulfill our mission as a Catholic Parish.

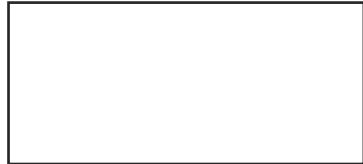
